## **Pupil Premium**

#### What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

The Pupil Premium Grant, introduced by the government in April 2011, is additional funding given to schools to help close the attainment gap between children from vulnerable backgrounds and their peers. Pupil Premium is primarily aimed at Reception to Year 11 children who are from low income families and are eligible for free school meals (FSM). The funding also covers children in care aged 4-15 (LAC) who have been looked after for more than 6 months. A service premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are serving in the armed forces.

Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is schools responsibility to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for individual children. It is not ring-fenced and schools are free to spend it as they wish, however schools will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support children from disadvantaged families.

# <u>Pupil Premium – How it works at Purston Infant School</u>

At Purston Infant School our philosophy is to give all children 'the best start' through a nurturing environment. We have high aspirations for all children and endeavour to allocate the Pupil Premium effectively and strategically so that underachieving children are given every opportunity to succeed. The tables below show the pupil premium allocation for the year and how we intend to apportion the money. Throughout the year we will track children's progress and monitor the effectiveness of the expenditure, amending any actions if necessary. At the end of the year we will examine the impact for the following year.

#### **Foundation Stage:**

- The percentage of children achieving 'Good Level of Development' remained the same as 2014. We did not achieve our improvement target for this group because a number of children who were predicted a GLD left and the children who joined us were immature and still emerging.
- This has impacted on the gap between the pupil premium and their peers as it is greater than the previous year.

### Year1:

• There has been a significant improvement in the percentage of children passing the phonics screening test from the previous years, reducing the gap further between the pupil and non-pupil premium children.

#### In Year 2:

- There has been an improvement in the percentage of children passing the phonics re-takes from the previous year.
- Data for Year 2 shows a fragmented picture in terms of improvement in attainment. The Average Point scores (APS) shows a decline in most subjects with the exception of writing. However there are clearly improvements in some areas.
- The pupil premium children in this cohort had the lowest baselines of all groups, with the exception of
  the SEN group, yet they made good to outstanding progress. In Reading 89% made expected progress
  with 33% better than expected. In Writing, 100% made expected, with 22% better than expected. In
  Maths 89% made expected progress with 56% making better than expected, this was significantly better
  than their peers.
